Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. 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EARLY AND LATER YEARS.

How Literacy Shapes Our Lives from Childhood to Adulthood.

Literacy is more than just the ability to read and write. It is also the capacity to

communicate, learn, and participate effectively in various aspects of life, such as economic, social, and civic domains. Literacy can influence how we interact with and contribute to the world around us. However, the quality of our participation in life can also depend on the level of basic literacy that we acquired in our early years. In this issue, the Feature Article on the "Importance of Basic Education" discusses the objectives and benefits of basic education for life. It emphasizes the need for an early start in learning. However, in Nigeria, early childhood education is not compulsory though it is provided by private and public schools.

Why is Early Childhood Education Important?

Early childhood education is the foundation for lifelong learning and development. According to the University of Connecticut's Centre for Education Policy Analysis, Research and Evaluation (CEPARE), "Nearly 90% of a child's neural pathways, or brain connections, are established by the time they are six-years old (Morin, n.d.). Children who have abundant opportunities to interact with language from infancy to early elementary school are more likely to develop into skilled and fluent readers because these experiences allow them to develop the many neural pathways necessary for developing literacy skills."

In other words, a young child's ability to develop spoken language, comprehension for written language, understanding spoken and written words could be hindered if early experiences to focus on Early Childhood Education is not a priority. Oral language, alphabetic principle and print awareness are most important for the early formative years so that there will be less likelihood of experiencing difficulties in reading and academics, later in life. Failure to focus on Early childhood education and literacy can also be disruptive to cognitive development, social skills and mental wellbeing.

The African Union (AU) has a policy on early childhood education that is part of its Continental Education Strategy for Africa (CESA 16-25).

The policy aims to promote and support the provision of quality and inclusive early childhood education and development (ECED) for all children in Africa. According to the policy, ECED is the pillar for future learning and the next frontier for achieving quality education and training in Africa.

- **Enhance policy, advocacy and communication on ECED**
- **Intensify action to improve equitable access to quality ECED programmes and services**
- **Improve the quality of ECED systems, programmes and services**
- **Enhance governance and accountability for ECED**
- **Enhance research generation, documentation and dissemination on ECED**
- **Strengthen partnership and collaboration across all key stakeholders for ECED**

2.0. Guest Speaker: Strategies to support and promote Adult Literacy among interested individuals. The representative of the guest speaker, Action Daniel, spoke brilliantly on adult literacy. *“Everyone needs education, basic literacy; literacy is power”.*

Literacy in itself encompasses speaking, reading, writing, numeracy and the likes. However, over the years, with the digital world, literacy has since moved further ahead.

The potentials and skills inherent in people can only be best communicated when one is literate. Information is power and so is literacy. An uneducated person would have denied himself networking, principle to enjoy certain qualities of life and a whole lot of other benefits. The benefits of literacy cannot be overemphasized.

Adult Literacy is peculiar to people from the age of 15 and above. Findings have revealed that there is a commission tasked in promoting adult literacy and non-formal education at the government level.

Nigerian has a high percentage of illiterates. The major challenge encountered by the government is the Unwillingness of people to participate. The do not submit themselves to learning.

Rotary so far has done significantly more in promoting literacy and basic education because it is beneficial to our existence. Basic reading and writing is the major skill being promoted by rotary.

Two notable techniques used for adult literacy are; 1. Basic Adult literacy, 2. Vocational adult literacy. The process used are; i. Create a committee, ii. Carry out needs assessment, iii. Identify the key players, iv. Create Illiteracy map, v. Choose a scope to achieve.

Concluding, he extended the greetings from the deputy VC of Lasu Prof Ladipo and appreciated Rotary for all they do.

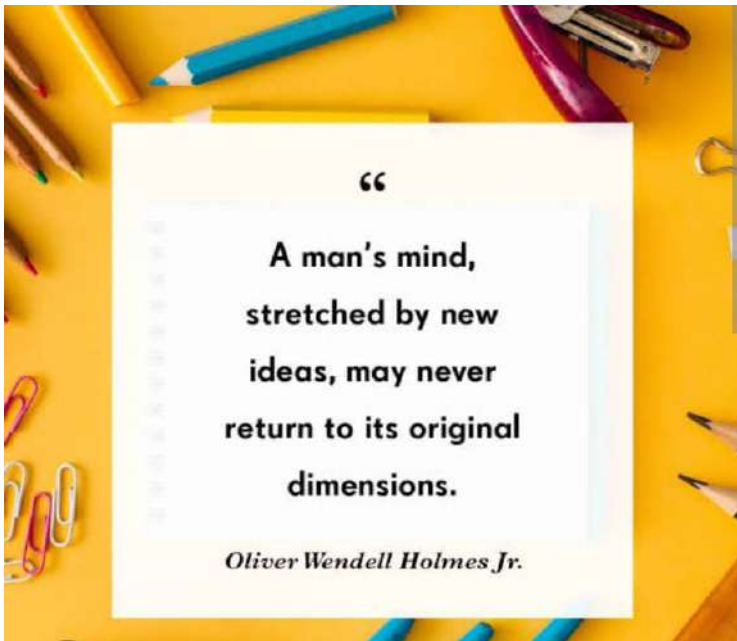
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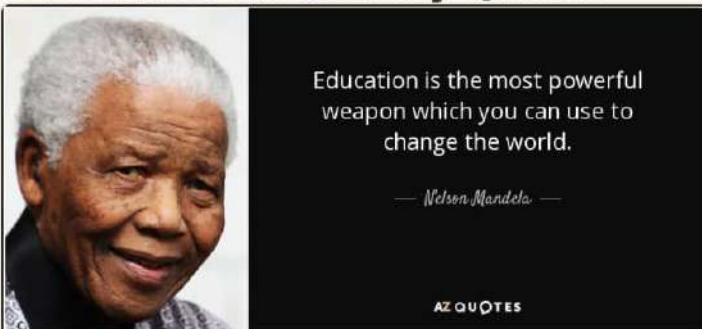

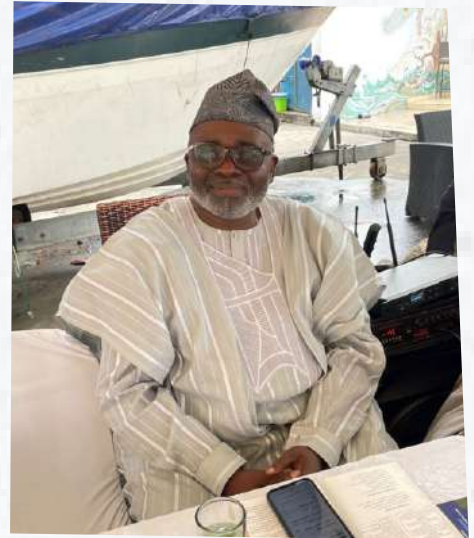

FEATURE: IMPORTANCE OF EDUCATION

Primary education is one of the basic needs of human. The difference that basic education can make to human life is easy to see. There are many important features of getting the basic education in childhood as discussed below.

Deprivation: The most basic issue relates to the elementary fact that illiteracy and innumeracy are forms of insecurity in themselves. Not to be able to read or write or count or communicate is a tremendous deprivation.

The extreme case of insecurity is the certainty of deprivation and the absence of any chance of avoiding that fate. The first and most immediate contribution of successful basic education is a direct reduction of this basic deprivation.

GOALS OF BASIC EDUCATION

There are basically four main goals of basic education of a child which are listed below.

Read with comprehension, write effectively, and communicate successfully in a variety of ways and settings and with a variety of audiences.

Know and apply the core concepts and principles of mathematics; social, physical, and life sciences; civics and history, including different cultures and participation in representative government; geography; arts; and health and fitness.

Think analytically, logically, and creatively and to integrate technology literacy and fluency as well as different experiences and knowledge to form reasoned judgments and solve problems.

Understand the importance of work and finance and how performance, effort, and decisions directly affect future career and educational opportunities.

Literacy is the ability to use printed and written information to function in society, to achieve one's goals, and to develop one's knowledge and potential.

Basic literacy skills include reading, writing, listening, and speaking.

Digital literacy is the ability to use information and communication technologies to find, evaluate, create, and communicate.



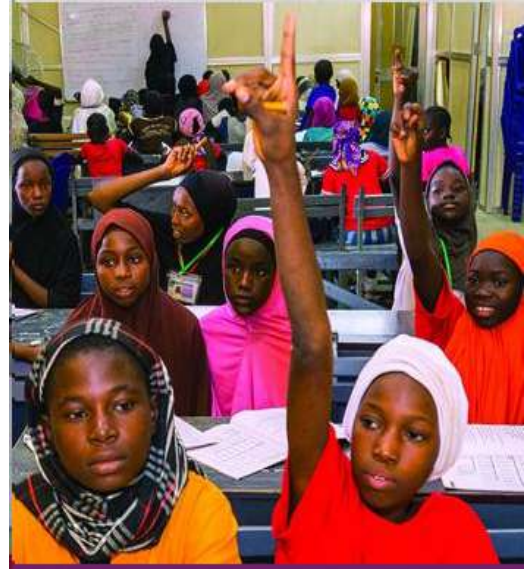

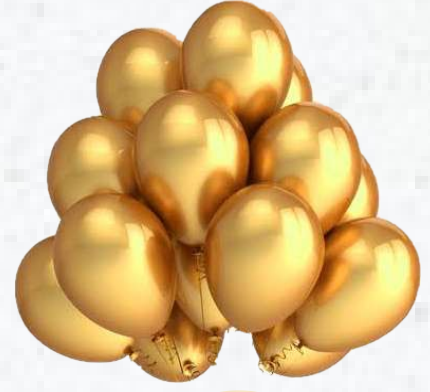

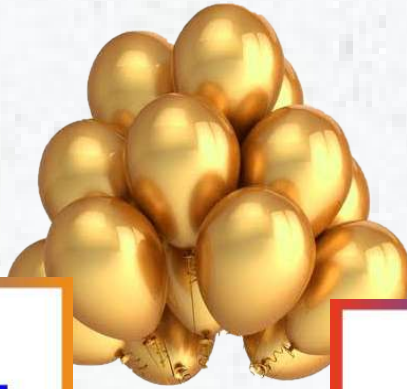
